Francis Bacon's *New Atlantis*: Science, Religion, and Politics

My dissertation focuses on Francis Bacon as the founder of the modern scientific project and his *New Atlantis* as the source of his teaching on politics. I begin by describing Bacon's manner of writing and show how *New Atlantis* is structured as a pedagogical work that intends to introduce potential statesmen to the political problems which must be managed. I argue that despite Bacon's extensive rhetorical use of "charity," Christian doctrine offers no useful guidance in the exercise of political judgment and, indeed, that the scientific project decisively weakens the role of religion in guiding human life. The material benefits of the power over nature exercised by the scientific enterprise is at least in part an attempt to prevent conflict by suppressing popular concern with justice and right. Finally, a reflection on civic virtue and statesmanship in Baconian politics helps reveal the possibilities and limitations of contemporary politics while also highlighting the troubling moral situation in which we are left precisely because of the success of Bacon's project.
